"REFRACTION OF DIAMOND," a new work by artist Michael Curry of Michael Curry Mosaics in New York City, is a visual delight of silvered glass in shades of emerald and sky. "I began by creating a single triangular block consisting of green mirror on one side and blue mirror on the other side," says Curry, who puts a modern spin on the ancient art of mosaics with one-of-a-kind glass wall sculptures. "I was curious to see what would happen if I duplicated this block and then repeated it in an alternating pattern. Nine hundred blocks later, the result was a dramatic melding of color from left to right as well as top to bottom.

"But what was most interesting to me was the mirage of diamonds that began to appear," he says. "The blocks reflected themselves to create diamonds within diamonds."

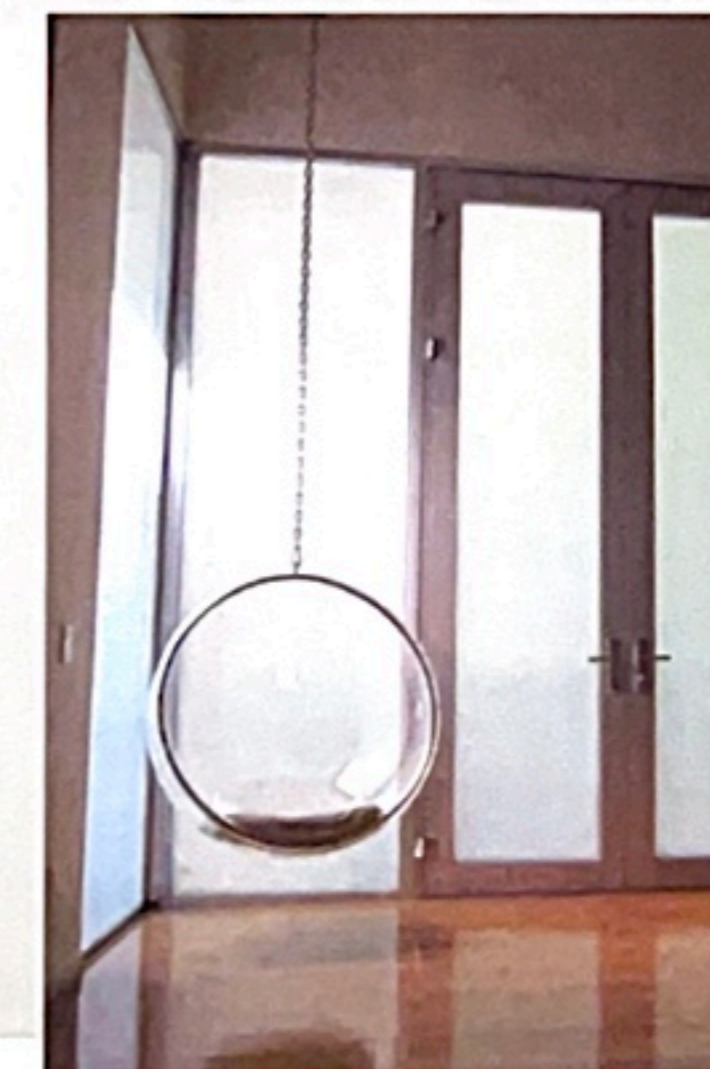
